Sebastian Niculescu and Priya Mishra are not only the top-ranking students in the high school's Class of 2015, they are also models of consistent excellence. Niculescu and Mishra boast remarkable lists of accolades, ranging from their academic accomplishments to arts and student government. Their bodies of work represent firm beliefs in hard work, and each has effectively and brilliantly laid the foundation for a promising future.

As Valedictorian, Niculescu has an overall weighted average of 102.41. He was named to all subject area honor societies, is a member of the National Honor and Merit Scholars Society, vice president of the National French Honor Society, co-president of the National Art Honor Society, treasurer of the National Science Honor Society, and secretary of the Model United Nations club. He has also served on the executive board for the Science Olympiad team.

He supplemented a most rigorous schedule with online mathematics and science-oriented classes. Through institutions including the Johns Hopkins Center for Talented Youth, Brookhaven National Lab and the Institute of Mathematics

Education, Research and Instructional Technology, Niculescu fulfilled his thirst for constant learning by enrolling in summer courses. In August, he began Multivariable Calculus with Linear Algebra, a college-level course at Stony Brook University. He conducted independent research in variable metric spaces and began to independently study abstract algebra. He also traveled to Romania and France, and immersed himself in learning the Romanian language and culture. He practiced his French in Paris and explored art history at museums such as the Louvre and Centre Pompidou. He also continued making sculptures, installations and paintings.

Outside of school, Niculescu is on the executive board of the NYC Teen Art Gallery. His first painting, "Manifesto Zero," was showcased at Galerie Protégé's "Monster" exhibition. He had a video installation/sculpture titled "Dichotomy Number 1" at the "Green Light" exhibit, and curated the creative writing section of that exhibit. He earned first place in the Sculpture Category of the New York State Olympics of the Visual Arts.

"His work ethic and thirst for knowledge are extraordinary,"



said guidance counselor Alice Hannon. "Sebastian is artistic and creative as much as he is analytical and mathematically precise. It is an interesting and amazing combination that truly makes him the extraordinary young man I have grown to know and respect immensely."

Niculescu will attend the Brown-Rhode Island School of Design Dual Degree Program, a 5 year program that will allow him to earn two degrees (one from each school). Only 17 students were admitted internationally.

Salutatorian Mishra has an overall weighted average of 101.75. She has taken several honors and AP courses throughout high school, and is currently enrolled in seven AP courses. She is president of the National Honor Society and secretary of the Equality Club.



Her artwork has been displayed at Heckscher Museum, where it won the Krasowitz Digital Portfolio Award.

Outside of school, Mishra practices karate and is being considered as a candidate for a black belt. She teaches karate to autistic children.

"Priya is an extraordinary person who is not just an academic, but also a student who embodies exceptional character," said Sanjay Paranande, her guidance counselor. "She is driven, yet she remains grounded, humble, honest and compassionate. [She] is focused and goal-oriented. Priya is the type of person who is always looking to challenge herself academically and works very hard to achieve her goals. What sets [her] apart is her ability to manage her time."

Mishra will attend Columbia University in the fall where she will major in Computer Science.

The Hicksville High School Chapter of the National Honor Society inducted 141 new members during its annual ceremony in the school's auditorium.

President Priya Mishra, vice president Kaitlyn Sullivan, corresponding secretary Anna Cheng, recording secretary Zafreen Siddiquee and treasurer Gabrielle Goubran led a candle-lighting ceremony prior to the announcement of the new members' names. Each candle was a different color to represent a character trait, and the NHS officers explained the society's list of virtues.

'Sparkle' Dazzles and Delights

For many years, band teacher Chad Wyman and art teacher Beth Atkinson had discussed the idea of a project that could be simultaneously presented for an incredible multimedia display. During the first week of the 2014-15 school year, Atkinson approached Wyman with a suggestion involving one of her finest students.

Enter the high school's Class of 2015 Valedictorian, who can add yet another accolade to his stellar list of accomplishments. Standout Sebastian Niculescu spearheaded the collaboration, which was highlighted to perfection at the district's band concert in March.

Niculescu, who was named a scholar-artist earlier in the year, created a multimedia medley of moving images to accompany the high school wind ensemble's performance of "Sparkle," a seven-minute piece of music. He represented his vision through 13 different video creations, each of which was shown simultaneously on separate displays throughout the auditorium — six large television sets, four projectors displaying their images on walls, and three built-in screens. The videos, which were comprised of various images such as hands, mouths and eyes, were shown using DVD players, and each had to be triggered at the exact same time to ensure

alignment with the music.

In addition to the 42 members of the wind ensemble who performed "Sparkle," 26 student volunteers assisted the setup and execution of the coordinated piece. Video technology teacher Adam Clive worked with Wyman and Atkinson to support and present Niculescu's creation accurately.

"Sebastian is an immensely talented artist," Wyman said. "Sparkle' gave Sebastian a blank canvas to create his own interpretation. While he works with different media, he has become quite adept at creating multimedia art through the use of video."

"I never had a student who thinks the way Sebastian thinks," Atkinson said. "He's been working on this since the beginning of the school year, and he's been immersed in perfecting it. Sebastian's vision, and what he has created, is truly remarkable."

STUDENTS, TEACHERS PUT THE "ART IN HEART"

Nine students and three teachers throughout the district had their artwork displayed at the Broadway Mall's "Art in HeART" exhibit from March 10 to April 19. "Art in HeART" is a countywide show sponsored by the Long Island chapter of the New York State Art Teachers Association.
