



FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS for Beginning the 2021-2022 School Year

Please understand that the district will continue to study the trends of the pandemic and will make adjustments as necessary.

Q: Are masks going to be required?

A: The district is mask friendly but we retain the ability to mandate masks. Properly wearing a face covering is a proven method to deter the spread of any airborne virus. Each situation may require a different level of masking. For example, a classroom may be required to wear a mask for a time period if there was an exposure during the school day.

Q: Will we still physically distance?

A: The district will emphasize physical distancing, but not to the levels we employed last year.

Q: Will we return to a normal school day?

A: The daily class schedule, class sizes, and student mobility will return to pre-pandemic patterns. We have increased each building's ability to incorporate fresh air which will help defend against all airborne illnesses.

Q: Will you provide virtual learning and how?

A: The district will not be offering the 100% virtual options that we did last year. We do have the ability to continue instruction for short term absences such as quarantine situations. Our teachers will provide access to content for students during a short term absence. At the primary levels we will continue to use SeeSaw and the rest of our students will use Schoology as a learning management system.

Q: Will sports/activities be normal this year?

A: The district will follow the guidelines for extra-curricular activities provided by the WIAA. All other activities will follow local expectations. Friends and families are welcome to attend our events.

Q: Will we require vaccines?

A: The Platteville School District will not require vaccines.

Q: Will you use 7, 10, 14 day quarantine?

A: All quarantine situations will be determined in conjunction with the Grant County Health Department. The school district assists in collecting information and the Grant County Health Department delivers expectations of a quarantine.
